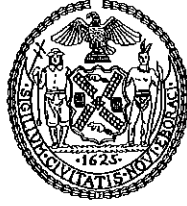

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BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS SUBJECT TO WEBCASTING LAW

Included below is a list of City boards and commissions which are subject both to the Open Meetings Law and to Local Law 103 of 2013, the "Webcasting Law". The list consists of 45 boards and commissions, which were chosen on the following basis:

- First, a board or commission must be subject to the Open Meetings Law. That statute applies to any public body consisting of two or more members which exercises a governmental function. Boards and commissions which have a purely advisory function, that is, exercise no decision-making authority and play no required role in a decision-making process, are not subject to the Open Meetings Law.
- Second, a board or commission must be subject to the legislative authority of the City Council, which passed Local Law 103. Boards and commissions established by local law are clearly subject to the Council's legislative authority. A board or commission, even if it acts on behalf of the City of New York, is not within the Council's legislative authority if it was established by the State Legislature and its functions are governed by State law. An exception exists only when the governing State law provides specifically that the board or commission must comply with certain provisions of local law.¹
